
## WHSG Atlanta Report for January 2017



## **Community Involvement**

All of the at WHSG were involved in various Christmas programs and celebrations at their churches. Many provided food for outreaches and donated gifts for their benevolence giving. We prepared separate boxes for the homeless people who live down the street from our studios. We included soap, tooth brushes and tooth paste, warm blankets, scarves, hats, and other sundries. We also donated gently used adult and children clothes, plus a cash donation to a local church organization called "None Suffer Lack."

On January 16th a local organization called Hosea Helps hosted its annual MLK dinner to honor the legacy of the late Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Held at the Georgia World Congress Center, over 6,000 needy individuals from the community received a full course meal and other traditional Hosea Helps services including a haircut and style, clothing, shoes, blankets, medical care, flu shots — free home delivery to seniors and shut-ins. WHSG made a generous donation toward the dinner and our own Nathan Casoria, Julie Haston, Heather Jaros, Sondra Brumlow, Robert Breneman, and Clay Jones attended the event (see pictures below).



At least a dozen police officers have been killed in the line of duty this year across America — four of them right were here in Georgia. The Atlanta Police Union held its annual fund drive and called to ask if we could contribute this year. Funds are used to assist families with funeral costs and other necessities to help during difficult days. WHSG/TBN made a generous contributed to this worthy organization.

Atlanta's own Bishop Eddie Long passed away in January after a lengthy illness. He was a TBN program partner for two decades. A representative from WHSG represented TBN at Bishop Long's memorial service.
